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1. Basic Information About the Funding Opportunity

Summary: The fiscal year 2026 (FY26) Arthritis Research Program (ATRP) Clinical Research Award (CRA) supports clinical research that evaluates disease-specific factors and interventions. Research is intended to generate clinically useful evidence with potential to optimize patient outcomes and inform clinical care or policy. **Research addressing any and all types of arthritis is encouraged.**

Applications must address one of two FY26 ATRP CRA Focus Areas: Prevention and Early Diagnosis, or Treatment and Mitigation of Disease Progression/Burden.

Distinctive Features: The FY26 ATRP CRA offers funding for two research levels. It is the responsibility of the applicant to select the level that aligns with the scope of the proposed research.

- **Research Level 1:** Applications proposing clinical research or early-phase/pilot clinical trials, to include new or emerging research that is not ready for a full-scale randomized controlled clinical trial.
- **Research Level 2:** Applications proposing a full-scale clinical trial.

Applications should include a community collaborator (e.g., patient/care partner, community-based organization consultant) who will provide advice and consultation during study design and throughout study planning and implementation. The ATRP **encourages** a community collaborator for **Research Level 1** applications and **requires** a community collaborator for **Research Level 2** applications.

Preliminary and/or published data are required.

Funding Details: The Congressionally Directed Medical Research Programs (CDMRP) expects to allot roughly \$7.15M to fund approximately three Clinical Research Award – Research Level 1 applications and one Clinical Research Award – Research Level 2 application with total cost caps of \$1.30M for Research Level 1 and \$3.25M for Research Level 2. The maximum period of performance is 4 years for both research levels. It is anticipated that awards made from this FY26 funding opportunity will be funded with FY26 funds, which will expire for use on September 30, 2032. Awards supported with FY26 funds will be made no later than September 30, 2027.

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2. Eligibility Information

2.1. Eligible Applicants

2.1.1. Organization

[Extramural](#) and [intramural U.S. Department of War \(DOW\)](#) organizations are eligible to apply, ***including foreign and domestic organizations, for-profit and nonprofit organizations, and public or private entities.***

2.1.2. Principal Investigator

Independent investigators affiliated with an eligible organization are eligible to be named Principal Investigator (PI) on the application, regardless of ethnicity, nationality or citizenship status.

An investigator may be named PI on no more than two FY26 ATRP applications across both award mechanisms, in any combination.

2.2. Cost Sharing

Cost sharing is not an eligibility requirement.

2.3. Other

Awards are made to eligible ***organizations***, not to individuals. Refer to the GAI for additional [recipient qualification requirements](#).

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3. Program Description

The Defense Health Agency Contracting Activity (DHACA) is soliciting applications to this funding opportunity using delegated authority provided by United States Code, Title 10, Section 4001 (10 USC 4001). The CDMRP is the program office managing this FY26 funding opportunity as part of the Arthritis Research Program (ATRP). The CDMRP is located within the Defense Health Agency Research and Development (DHA R&D), which is a part of the Department of Defense, DOD, herein referred to using the secondary title Department of War, DOW. Congress initiated the ATRP in 2024 to provide support for research of high potential impact and exceptional scientific merit focused on reducing the detrimental impact of arthritis on Service Members and their retention. The appropriation for the ATRP for FY24 was \$10 million (M). The FY26 appropriation is \$10M.

The vision of the ATRP is to lessen the burden of, and ultimately cure, arthritis. The mission is to fund high-impact research to optimize the health and well-being of all people affected by arthritis, and to improve Service Member readiness and retention. It is expected that research findings from awards funded by the ATRP will also benefit those who receive care through the Military Health System and those within the general population. As mandated by Congress, the ATRP will support high-impact research on any type of arthritis, including but not limited to osteoarthritis, post-traumatic arthritis, inflammatory arthritis, juvenile arthritis and rheumatoid arthritis. The ATRP encourages applications that provide solutions for and also examine the impact of arthritis in understudied populations such as women, minorities, or less prevalent arthritis types.

3.1. Intent of the Clinical Research Award

The FY26 ATRP Clinical Research Award (CRA) is intended to support clinical research that evaluates disease-specific factors and interventions. Research supported by this mechanism is intended to generate clinically useful evidence with potential to optimize patient outcomes and inform clinical care or policy. Research addressing **any and all types of arthritis** is encouraged including but not limited to osteoarthritis, post-traumatic arthritis, inflammatory arthritis, juvenile arthritis or rheumatoid arthritis. The ATRP encourages applications that address sex as a biological variable and understudied arthritis types. The ATRP also encourages applicants to consider whether large datasets or existing studies/consortia can be leveraged to maximize the potential impact of the proposed research.

Applicants must address how the proposed research will impact patient care and reduce the burden of disease. It is expected that any research findings would benefit Service Members, Veterans, their Families and the general public.

3.1.1. Focus Areas for the CRA

To meet the intent of the funding opportunity, applications submitted to this program announcement must address one of the following FY26 ATRP CRA Focus Areas listed below.

- **Prevention and Early Diagnosis:** Identify factors capable of predicting the onset or progression of disease, and/or identify technologies, solutions, or knowledge products for the prevention of arthritis.
- **Treatment and Mitigation of Disease Progression/Burden:** Evaluate interventions or treatment strategies that address the multifactorial burden of arthritis. This may include

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solutions which address one or more of the following factors: pain or other symptoms, function, psychosocial factors, comorbidities, or the pathologic burden of disease.

Disease Subtype: Applicants must select the primary arthritis type that the study seeks to address.

- Osteoarthritis
- Post-traumatic arthritis
- Rheumatoid arthritis
- Juvenile arthritis
- Inflammatory arthritis
- Other arthritis type not listed
- Non-specific/general arthritis

Selection of the appropriate focus area and disease subtype are the responsibility of the applicant.

3.1.2. Key Elements for the CRA

Important aspects of this award mechanism include:

- **Impact:** The application should explicitly state how outcomes of the proposed research will have a significant impact on arthritis disease management, patient care, and quality of life.
- **Relevance to Military Health:** The application should clearly describe how the research addresses the impact of arthritis in the military, which may include its effect on Service Member recruitment, retention and recovery. Applicants may also choose to include impacts to the Military Health System, which provides health care support to Service Members and their Families ([Eligibility | TRICARE](#)).
- **Post-Award Transition Plan:** The application should include the plan by which knowledge gained after successful completion of the award will be implemented in guidelines, communicated to relevant stakeholders, or moved to the next phase of development.
- **Employing Community Collaborations:** Research funded by the FY26 ATRP CRA should be responsive to the needs of lived experience/consumer, family, and care provider communities. Research teams are therefore encouraged (Research Level 1) or required (Research Level 2) to establish and utilize effective and equitable collaborations and partnerships with community members to maximize impact potential of the proposed research. Pre-applications and applications to the FY26 ATRP Clinical Research Award – Research Level 2 must incorporate a Community Collaboration to provide advice and consultation throughout the planning and implementation of the research project.

The Community Collaboration requires scientific researchers and community members to work together to address the critical challenges faced by persons affected by arthritis, particularly those in understudied populations such as women, minorities, or less prevalent arthritis types. Recognizing the strength of each partner, scientific researchers and community members ***collaborate and contribute equitably their expertise on all aspects of the project***, which may include needs assessment, planning, research intervention design, implementation, evaluation and dissemination. Researchers and community collaborators share responsibility for and ownership of the research project; and the

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research results are jointly interpreted, disseminated, and fed back to affected communities and may be translated into interventions or policy. This engagement is critically important for community-level interventions and disproportionately affected populations. These interactions can accelerate “bench to bedside” translation and augment the potential impact of research on people living with arthritis. Interactions between team members should be well integrated and ongoing, not limited to attending seminars and semi-annual meetings.

Collaborative relationships with the lived experience community are often established through integrating community members into research teams as co-researchers, advisors and/or consultants. Examples of Community Collaborations include:

- **Lived Experience Consultation:** The research team includes at least one project advisor impacted by arthritis who will provide advice and consultation throughout the planning and implementation of the research project. Lived Experience Consultants may include individuals with arthritis, their family members, and/or their care partners.
- **Partnership With a Community-Based Organization:** The research team establishes a partnership with at least one community-based organization that provides advice and consultation throughout the planning and implementation of the research project. Community-based organizations may include advocacy groups, service providers, policymakers or other formal organizational stakeholders.
- **Community Advisory Board Utilization:** A community advisory board is composed of multiple community stakeholders and can take many forms, from a board of Lived Experience Consultants to a coalition of community-based organizations, or any combination thereof. As with Lived Experience Consultants and organizational partners, the community advisory board provides advice and consultation throughout planning and implementation of the research project.

When developing applications for the ATRP CRA mechanism, the ATRP strongly encourages applicants to provide sufficient evidence to demonstrate the following key considerations:

- The availability of, and access to, the study population is sufficient.
- The availability of, and access to, the intervention.
- The study team composition is appropriate for the proposed research.
- The statistical considerations, data management and analysis plans are appropriate for the proposed research.

3.1.3. Other Important Considerations for the CRA

In accordance with the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2026, Section 732, CDMRP does not support the conduct of painful research (U.S. Department of Agriculture pain category D or E) involving domestic cats or dogs, except for studies relating to military or service animals.

[Clinical research](#) and [clinical trials](#) are allowed within this funding opportunity. Preclinical research, such as those involving cell lines or animals, is not supported in

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this funding opportunity. Applicants seeking funding for preclinical or animal research should consider the FY26 ATRP Translational Research Award mechanism (Funding Opportunity Number: HT942526ATRPTRA).

All projects should adhere to a core set of standards for rigorous study design and reporting to maximize the reproducibility and translational potential of clinical and preclinical research, such as those described in the [STROBE](#), [CONSORT](#), [SPIRIT](#) and [ARRIVE 2.0](#) guidelines.

Applications from investigators within the DOW and applications involving multidisciplinary collaborations among academia, industry, the DOW, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and other federal government agencies are highly encouraged. These relationships can leverage knowledge, infrastructure and access to unique clinical populations that the collaborators bring to the research effort, ultimately advancing research that is of significance to Service Members, Veterans, their Families and the American Public. If the proposed research relies on access to unique resources or databases, the application must describe the access at the time of submission and include a plan for maintaining access as needed throughout the proposed research.

3.3. Funding Instrument

The funding instrument for awards made under the program announcement will be grants (31 USC 6304).

3.4. Funding Details

Period of Performance: The maximum period of performance is **4** years.

Cost Cap: The application's total costs budgeted for the entire period of performance should not exceed **\$1.3M for Research Level 1** or **\$3.25M for Research Level 2**.

Research Level 1: Applications proposing clinical research or early-phase/pilot clinical trials, to include new or emerging research that is not ready for a full-scale randomized controlled clinical trial.

Research Level 2: Applications proposing a full-scale clinical trial.

The requested funding level should align with the scope of the research proposed and the research level description.

If indirect cost rates have been negotiated, indirect costs are to be budgeted in accordance with the organization's negotiated rate. Collaborating organizations should budget associated indirect costs in accordance with each organization's negotiated rate.

All direct and indirect costs of any subaward or contract must be included in the direct costs of the primary award.

The applicant may request the entire maximum funding amount for a project that may have a period of performance less than the maximum **4** years.

The appropriateness of the budget for the proposed research will be assessed during peer review.

Direct Cost Restrictions: For this award mechanism, direct costs:

May be requested for (not all-inclusive):

- Travel in support of multi-institutional collaborations.

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- Costs for one investigator to travel to two scientific/technical meetings per year. The intent of travel to scientific/technical meetings should be to present project information or disseminate project results from the ATRP Clinical Research Award.

Must not be requested for:

- Preclinical research costs.
- Animal research costs.
- Costs for travel to scientific/technical meeting(s) beyond the limits stated above.

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4. Application Contents and Format

4.1. Application Overview

Application submission is a two-step process requiring both a **pre-application** submitted via the Electronic Biomedical Research Application Portal ([eBRAP](#)) and a **full application** submitted through eBRAP or Grants.gov. Depending on the submission portal, certain aspects of the application will differ.

Intramural DOW organizations submitting a full application should follow instructions for submission through eBRAP.



Extramural organizations submitting a full application must follow instructions for submission through Grants.gov.



4.2. Pre-Application Components

Pre-application submissions must include the following components.

- When starting the pre-application, applicants will be asked to select the primary arthritis type addressed by the proposed research: osteoarthritis, post-traumatic arthritis, rheumatoid arthritis, juvenile arthritis, inflammatory arthritis, other arthritis type not listed, or non-specific/general arthritis.

Upload documents as individual PDF files unless otherwise noted. Files must comply with the [formatting guidelines](#) listed in the GAI.

- **Preproposal Narrative (one-page limit):** The Preproposal Narrative page limit applies to text and non-text elements (e.g., figures, tables, graphs, photographs, diagrams, chemical structures, drawings) used to describe the project. Inclusion of URLs that provide additional information to expand the Preproposal Narrative and could confer an unfair competitive advantage is prohibited and may result in administrative withdrawal of the pre-application.

The Preproposal Narrative should include the following:

- **Background:** State the [FY26 ATRP CRA Focus Area](#) addressed by the proposed research. Briefly present the rationale behind the proposed clinical study.
 - **Hypothesis/Objective(s):** State the hypothesis to be tested and/or objective(s) to be reached.
 - **Specific Aims:** State the specific aims of the study.
 - **Study Design:** Briefly describe the study design, including appropriate controls. If the study involves a clinical trial, specify the clinical trial phase.
 - **Impact:** Briefly describe how the proposed clinical project will impact patient care and reduce the burden of arthritis disease. Briefly describe how the research outcomes will be relevant to the military.
- **Pre-Application Supporting Documentation:** The items to be included as supporting documentation for the pre-application ***must be uploaded as individual files*** and are limited to the following:
 - **References Cited (one-page limit):** List the references cited (including URLs if available) in the Preproposal Narrative using a standard reference format that includes

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the full citation (i.e., author[s], year published, reference title, and reference source, including volume, chapter, page numbers, and publisher, as appropriate).

- **List of Abbreviations, Acronyms and Symbols:** Provide a list of abbreviations, acronyms and symbols used in the Preproposal Narrative.

4.3. Full Application Components

Applicants must receive an invitation to submit a full application. Uninvited full application submissions will be rejected.

Each application submission must include the completed full application package for this program announcement. See [Appendix 1](#) for a checklist of the full application components.

Each attachment of the full application components must be uploaded as an individual file in the format specified and in accordance with the [formatting guidelines](#) in the GAI.

- **Attachment 1: Project Narrative (12-page limit): Upload as “ProjectNarrative.pdf”.** 

Describe the proposed project in detail using the outline below.

- **Background:** Describe in detail the scientific rationale for the study. Clearly state how the proposed research addresses the selected [FY26 ATRP CRA Focus Area\(s\)](#), and how research findings will generate clinically useful evidence with potential to optimize patient outcomes and inform clinical care or policy. Provide a review and analysis of the available literature and completed/ongoing studies relevant to the proposed clinical study.
 - Describe the preliminary studies and/or preclinical data that support the proposed clinical study.
 - Provide a summary of other relevant ongoing, planned or completed clinical research efforts, and describe how the proposed study differs.
 - If applicable, summarize key preclinical pharmacological findings, dosage studies and other clinical studies that examine the safety and stability (as appropriate) of the intervention.

If the proposed clinical study was initiated using other funding prior to this application, explain the history and background of the clinical research and declare the source(s) of prior funding. Identify the specific portions of the study that will be supported with funds from this award.

- **Intervention:**

- ***If an intervention will not be utilized for the clinical effort***, describe how the proposed study meets the definition of [clinical research](#).
- ***If an intervention will be utilized for the clinical effort***, identify the intervention to be tested. Include the following components, as applicable:


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- ❖ Intervention type (drug, device, behavioral, surgical, etc.), complete name and composition, source, general concept of design, administration route. Indicate who holds the intellectual property rights to the intervention, if applicable, and how the PI has obtained access to those rights, along with access to the intervention itself, for conduct of the clinical study.
 - ❖ As applicable, appropriate letters of commitment should be provided in [Attachment 2: Supporting Documentation](#), demonstrating the study team's access to the intervention(s) for the duration of the clinical study.
 - ❖ Describe how the intervention addresses current clinical needs and how it compares with or improves currently available interventions and/or standards of care.
- **Objectives, Specific Aims and Hypotheses:** Describe the purpose of the proposed study with detailed objectives. State the hypothesis/research question to be tested in the proposed clinical research and detail the specific aims that will address the hypothesis/research question. Indicate whether the research addresses health areas and conditions that affect women uniquely, disproportionately or differently from men.
 - **Study Design:** Describe the proposed clinical research study in sufficient detail to evaluate its appropriateness and feasibility, relating to both the scientific success of the study and setting reasonable expectations of what study participants will experience. Consult appropriate [guidelines](#) to ensure relevant aspects of rigorous and reproducible research are adequately planned for and, ultimately, reported.
 - Describe the type of study to be performed. Outline the proposed clinical research methodology and study variables in sufficient detail to demonstrate a clear course of action and justification. Describe the interaction with the human subject, including the study intervention (if applicable) that they will experience, and include the dose and administration route. Provide sufficient detail in chronological order for a person not involved in the study to understand what the study participant will experience.
 - Provide a schedule (e.g., flowchart or diagram) of study intervention(s), evaluation(s), and follow-up procedures, including, if applicable, the biospecimen that will be collected, the collection schedule and amount. Describe measures to ensure consistency of dosing (e.g., active ingredients for nutritional supplements, rehabilitation interventions). Specify the standard of care. Define each arm/study group of the proposed study, if applicable, and describe how group assignment will occur. Include a description of controls, as appropriate. Specify the approximate number of study participants to be enrolled. Indicate whether subjects, clinicians, data analysts and/or others will be blinded during the study. Describe any other measures to be taken to reduce bias.
 - Define all endpoints/outcome measures relevant to the objectives of the study; explain why they were chosen, and describe how, when and where they will be measured. Include all evaluations that will be made for study purposes. If questionnaires or other research data collection instruments will be used, include a copy of them in [Attachment 2: Supporting Documentation](#). Describe the reliability and validity of the selected endpoints/outcome measures and evaluations, along with the applicable quality standards. Explain how the results of evaluations and/or data collection instruments will be used to meet the objectives of the study (or to monitor safety of human subjects).

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- Briefly describe the study population and the inclusion and exclusion criteria that will be used to meet the needs of the proposed clinical study. Additional details should be provided in [Attachment 7: Study Population Recruitment and Safety Plan](#).
- **Statistical Plan and Data Analysis:** Describe the statistical model and data analysis plan with respect to the study objectives. Ensure sufficient information is provided to allow for a thorough evaluation of statistical calculations during review of the application.
 - Include a complete power analysis to demonstrate that the proposed clinical study’s anticipated sample size is appropriate to meet the objectives of the study. Describe all clinical and statistical justifications and assumptions that support the sample size calculations. Explain any anticipated subgroup analyses and demonstrate that such analyses will be appropriately powered.
 - Describe the strategy for how sex will be considered as a biological variable. This strategy should include a brief discussion of what is currently known regarding sex differences in the applicable research area. Clearly articulate how sex as a biological variable will be factored into the data analysis plan and how data will be collected and disaggregated by sex. Refer to the [CDMRP Directive on Sex as a Biological Variable in Research](#) for additional information.
 - For phase 3 clinical trials, describe plans for the valid and sufficiently powered analysis of group differences on the basis on sex, race and/or ethnicity as appropriate for the scientific goals of the study. Refer to the [CDMRP Directive on the Inclusion of Women and Minorities as Subjects in Clinical Research](#) for additional information on the requirements for phase 3 studies.
- **Pitfalls and Mitigation Strategy:** Describe potential challenges and discuss alternative methods/approaches that may be employed to overcome them.
- **Attachment 2: Supporting Documentation: Combine and upload as a single file named “Support.pdf”.** 

There are no page limits for these components unless otherwise noted. Include only components described below; inclusion of items not requested or viewed as an extension of the Project Narrative will result in the removal of those items or may result in administrative withdrawal of the application.

- **References Cited:** List the references cited in the Project Narrative using a standard reference format (include URLs, if available).
- **List of Abbreviations, Acronyms and Symbols:** Provide a list of abbreviations, acronyms and symbols.
- **Facilities, Existing Equipment and Other Resources:** Describe the facilities and equipment available for performance of the proposed project; include any additional facilities or equipment proposed for acquisition at no cost to the award. Indicate whether government-furnished facilities or equipment are proposed for use. If so, reference the original or present government award under which the facilities or equipment items are now accountable. There is not a standardized form for this information.
- **Publications and/or Patents:** Include a list of relevant publication URLs and/or patent abstracts. If articles are not publicly available, then copies of up to five

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published manuscripts may be included in Attachment 2. Extra items will not be reviewed.


- **Letters of Support (two-page limit per letter is recommended):** Provide individual letters signed by collaborating individuals and/or organizational officials demonstrating that the PI has the support and resources necessary for the proposed work. Letters from the PI's Department Chair, or appropriate organization official, should also confirm that the PI(s) meet [eligibility criteria](#). If applicable, provide a letter of support, signed by the lowest-ranking person with approval authority, confirming participation of intramural DOW collaborator(s) and/or access to military populations, databases or DOW resources. If applicable, provide a letter of support signed by the VA Facility Director(s), or an individual designated by the VA Facility Director(s), confirming access to VA patients, resources and/or VA research space.
- **Commercial Entity Letters of Commitment (if applicable; one-page limit per letter is recommended):** If the proposed study involves use of a commercially produced investigational drug, device, or biologic, provide a letter of commitment from the commercial entity indicating the availability of the product for the duration of the proposed clinical study, support for the proposed phase of research, and support for the indication to be tested.
- **Sex as a Biological Variable Strategy (two-page limit is recommended):** Describe the strategy for how sex will be considered as a biological variable. This strategy should include a brief discussion of what is currently known regarding sex differences in the applicable research area. Clearly articulate how sex as a biological variable will be factored into the data analysis plan and how data will be collected and disaggregated by sex. If needed, provide a strong rationale for proposing a single-sex study, based on justification from scientific literature, preliminary data or other relevant considerations. Refer to the [CDMRP Directive on Sex as a Biological Variable in Research](#) for additional information.

Provide a milestone plan for disseminating data/results including when data and resources will be made available to other users. In cases where the study participant could potentially derive medical or other benefit from the information, explain whether the results of screening and/or study participation will be shared with the participant or their primary care provider, including results from any screening or diagnostic tests performed as part of the study.

Do not submit a copy of the National Institutes of Health Data Management and Sharing Plan or duplicate the Data Management Plan which will be requested only after a recommendation for funding is made.

- **Clinical Impact:** Briefly describe how the proposed clinical trial will have a significant impact on the health and well-being of persons impacted by arthritis. Describe how the study is relevant to the military/military health.
- **Attachment 4: Lay Abstract (one-page limit): Upload as “LayAbs.pdf”.** 

The lay abstract should address the points outlined below *in a manner that is readily understood by readers without a background in science or medicine*. Avoid overuse of scientific jargon, acronyms and abbreviations. **Do not duplicate the technical abstract.**

- Summarize the objectives and rationale for the proposed research.
- What population will the research help, and how will it help them?
- What are the expected clinical applications and potential risks of the anticipated outcomes?
- Describe the ultimate applicability and impact of the proposed study and the anticipated outcomes to advancing research, patient care and/or quality of life?
- Describe the potential benefit of the proposed study and the anticipated outcomes to Service Members, Veterans and/or their Families.
- **Attachment 5: Statement of Work (five-page limit): Upload as “SOW.pdf”.** 
Refer to eBRAP for the [Suggested SOW Format](#).

For guidance on preparing the SOW, refer to the [Example: Assembling a Clinical Research and/or Clinical Trial Statement of Work](#). Include milestones for data or research resource(s) sharing.

- **Attachment 6: Impact Statement (three-page limit): Upload as “Impact.pdf”.** The impact statement summarizes the potential short- and long-term impact of the proposed clinical research study. The statement should address the points outlined below written

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in a manner that is readily understood by readers without a background in science or medicine. Overly technical jargon should be avoided and technical terms, if any, should be defined.

- Summarize the potential benefit(s) and anticipated outcomes of the intervention of the proposed clinical study as it relates to the [FY26 ATRP CRA Focus Area\(s\)](#)
- Detail the anticipated research outcome(s) that will be directly attributed to the results of the proposed clinical study and describe the anticipated benefits of these outcomes for individuals impacted by arthritis and the research field. Describe any relevant controversies, treatment issues or health disparities that will be addressed by the proposed study.
- Explain the long-range vision for how implementation/dissemination of the intervention and/or research outcome(s) will improve patient care and/or quality of life for the target population. Describe how the intervention, if applicable, represents an improvement over currently available interventions and/or standards of care.
- Describe any potential challenges that might limit the impact of the proposed clinical trial, including barriers to implementation or acceptance by users. Provide approaches to overcome those challenges
- Demonstrate how the proposed research project is relevant to military health and/or the health care needs and quality of life of Service Members, Veterans, or military Family member population(s) impacted by arthritis.
- Explicitly state how outcomes of the proposed research may lessen the impact of arthritis in the military, which may include its effect on Service Member recruitment, retention and recovery.
- If applicable, describe how the anticipated outcomes of the proposed study will make an impact in understanding health differences between sexes.
- If applicable, indicate to what extent the project findings are anticipated to lead to improvements in women’s health outcomes and/or advancements in knowledge for women’s health.
- **Attachment 7: Study Population Recruitment and Safety Plan (no page limit): Upload as “StudyPopPlan.pdf”.** Include the components listed below as applicable to the proposed study type.
 - **Enrollment Distribution:** Provide anticipated enrollment table(s) with the proposed enrollment distributed on the basis of sex, race and ethnicity using the [Public Health Service \(PHS\) Inclusion Enrollment Report](#). The enrollment table(s) should be appropriate to the objectives of the study.
 - **Inclusion/Exclusion Criteria:** List the inclusion and exclusion criteria for the proposed clinical study. If limiting inclusion by age, race, ethnicity or sex, provide strong rationale based on justification from scientific literature, preliminary data or other relevant considerations. List and describe any evaluations (e.g., laboratory procedures, history or physical examination) that are required to determine eligibility/suitability for study participation and the diagnostic criteria for entry. If applicable, describe how the study population represents the population anticipated to benefit from the intervention.
 - **Study Population Availability:** Demonstrate that the research team has access to the proposed study population at each site. Describe the approximate number,

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- pertinent demographic information and other relevant characteristics of the study population at each enrollment site. Indicate whether the actual size of available study population may be affected by ongoing clinical studies that compete for the same population. If the proposed research involves access to military and/or VA patient populations and/or DOW or VA resources or databases, describe the access at the time of submission and include a plan for maintaining access as needed throughout the proposed research. Also include a plan for obtaining any required data sharing, memorandum of understanding or other agreements required to access and publish data. Refer to the GAI, [Appendix 4](#), for additional considerations.
- **Recruitment and Retention Process:** Explain methods for identification of potential study participants (e.g., medical record review, obtaining sampling lists, health care provider identification). Describe the recruitment process in detail; address who will identify potential study participants, who will recruit them, and what methods will be used to recruit them. Describe any special care (e.g., wound dressing assistance, transportation due to side effects of study intervention impairing ability to drive) or equipment (e.g., thermometers, telemedicine equipment) needed for human subjects enrolled in the study. If study participants will be compensated, include a detailed description of and justification for the compensation plan. Describe the methods that will be employed to retain participants within the study. Discuss past efforts in recruiting and retaining study participants for previous clinical trials (if applicable). Address any potential barriers to accrual and plans for addressing unanticipated delays, including a mitigation plan for slow or low enrollment or poor retention. Estimate the potential for participant loss to follow up and how such loss will be handled/mitigated. Indicate whether the study team has considered barriers to clinical study or trial participation and, if applicable, how the team aims to mitigate or overcome these barriers.
 - **Women and Minorities Recruitment/Retention Strategy:** Describe the strategy for recruitment, enrollment and retention specific to women and minorities in the clinical study appropriate to the objectives of the study.
 - **Informed Consent Process:** Specifically describe the plan for obtaining informed consent from study participants; include information regarding the timing and location of the consent process. If minors or other populations that cannot provide informed consent are included in the proposed clinical study, describe the plan to obtain assent (agreement) from those with capacity to provide it, or a justification for a waiver of assent. [Appendix 6](#) of the GAI contains additional considerations unique to DOW-sponsored research.
 - **Risks/Benefits Assessment:**
 - **Foreseeable risks:** Clearly identify all study risks, including potential safety concerns and adverse events. Address special precautions to be taken by the human subjects before, during and after the study (e.g., medication washout periods, dietary restrictions, hydration, fasting, pregnancy prevention). Explain the extent to which the clinical study might affect the daily lives of the individual human subjects participating in the study. If applicable, identify any potential risk to the study personnel.
 - **Risk management and emergency response:** Appropriate to the study's level of risk, describe how safety monitoring and reporting to the Institutional Review Board (IRB) and Regulatory Agency (if applicable) will be managed and conducted. Describe all safety measures to minimize and/or eliminate risks to

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human subjects and study personnel or to manage unpreventable risks. Discuss the overall plan for provision of emergency care or treatment for an adverse event for study-related injuries, including who will be responsible for the costs of such care.

- **Potential benefits:** Describe known and potential benefits of the study to the human subjects who will participate in the study. Articulate the importance of the knowledge to be gained as a result of the proposed research. Discuss why the potential risks to human subjects are reasonable in relation to the anticipated benefits to the human subjects and others that may be expected to result.
- **Attachment 8: Study Personnel and Organization (no page limit): Start each document on a new page. Combine into one document and upload as “Personnel.pdf”.** The Study Personnel and Organization attachment should include the components listed below.
 - **Organizational Chart:** Provide an organizational chart that identifies key members of the study team and an outline of the governing structure for multi-institutional studies. Identify collaborating organizations, centers, and/or departments, and name each person’s position on the project; include any separate laboratory or testing centers. Identify the data and clinical coordinating center(s) and note any involvement from Contract Research Organizations, as appropriate, including the location of the organization. If applicable, identify the Regulatory Agency sponsor and any external consultants or other experts who will assist with Regulatory Agency sponsor applications. While there is no specified format for this information, a table(s) or diagram is recommended.
 - **Study Personnel Description:** Describe the composition of the study team in enough detail to determine whether the team includes relevant subject matter expertise to accomplish the proposed work. Include the roles of individuals named in the organizational chart along with any external consultants or advisors who will provide critical guidance and input to the study team (e.g., statistician, regulatory expert, commercialization consultant, clinical ethicist, patient advocate). Study coordinator(s) should be included. Describe how the levels of effort for each individual are appropriate to successfully support the proposed clinical trial.
 - **Study Management Plan:** Describe the day-to-day management of the proposed clinical study. Provide a plan for ensuring the standardization of procedures among staff and across sites (if applicable). If the proposed study involves more than one institution, clearly describe the multi-institutional structure governing the research protocol(s) across all participating institutions. If applicable, describe how communication and data transfer between/among the collaborating institutions will occur, as well as how data, specimens and/or imaging products obtained during the study will be handled and shared. Provide a plan for resolving intellectual and material property issues among participating organizations.
- **Attachment 9: Post-Award Transition Plan (three-page limit): Upload as “Transition.pdf”.** Discuss the anticipated methods and strategies necessary to move the anticipated research outcome (e.g., intervention, product, methodology, finding) to the next phase of development (e.g., clinical trials, commercialization and/or delivery to the civilian or military market), assuming a positive outcome from the proposed study. Investigators are encouraged to work with their organization’s Technology Transfer Office (or equivalent) to develop the transition plan. Applicants are encouraged to explore developing relationships with industry and/or other funding agencies or investors

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to facilitate moving the product into the next phase of development when preparing the transition plan. ***The post-award transition plan should:***

- Name the project’s anticipated research outcomes including knowledge products and/or clinical products for development. A “knowledge product” is a non-material product that aims to transition into medical practice, training, tools or to support material solutions; and educates or impacts behavior throughout the continuum of care, including primary prevention of negative outcomes.
 - Include a timeline with defined milestones describing the logical next steps to advance the research outcome to the next stage of clinical development/implementation/dissemination. Include steps regarding Regulatory Agency approval as appropriate.

- **Attachment 10: Community Collaboration Plan, if applicable (required for Research Level 2 applications; no page limit): Start each document on a new page. Combine and upload as “Collaboration.pdf”.**

Community Collaboration Statement (four-page limit): Research teams are encouraged (Research Level 1) and required (Research Level 2) to establish and utilize effective and equitable collaborations and partnerships with the arthritis lived experience community to maximize the impact potential of the proposed research. More detailed description and expectations of these collaborations/partnerships is included in [Section 3.1.2](#).

- Include the names of at least one community partner (e.g., Lived Experience Consultant, representative of community-based organization) who will provide advice and consultation throughout the planning and implementation of the research project. The individuals’ role in the project should be independent of their employment, and they cannot be employees of any of the organizations participating in the application.
- Describe the collaborative research approach that will be used (e.g., Lived Experience Consultation, partnership with community-based organization, community advisory board, co-researcher model) including a justification for the approach as well as when the approach will be used within the research project.
- Indicate the input from the community partner that has already and/or will be captured and how this input has and/or will be meaningfully integrated and

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incorporated into the needs assessment, planning, design, execution, analysis and/or dissemination of the research.

- Detail the resource allocation and decision-making processes to be employed.
- Describe any training that will be provided to both scientific researchers and community members on collaborative research approaches, decision-making and equitable participation.
- Describe co-learning and capacity-building activities among all partners.

Letter of Community Collaboration Support (two-page limit per letter): Provide a letter signed by each community partner (e.g., Lived Experience Consultants, representatives of community-based organizations) confirming their role and commitment to participate on the research team. If a community-based organization will be engaged, the letter of commitment should be signed by BOTH the organization point of contact leading the engagement along with a member of the organization’s leadership endorsing the collaboration, if different from the point of contact. The letter should include the qualifications and background of the individual and describe the relevance of those qualifications to the individual’s role within the team and to the proposed research project.

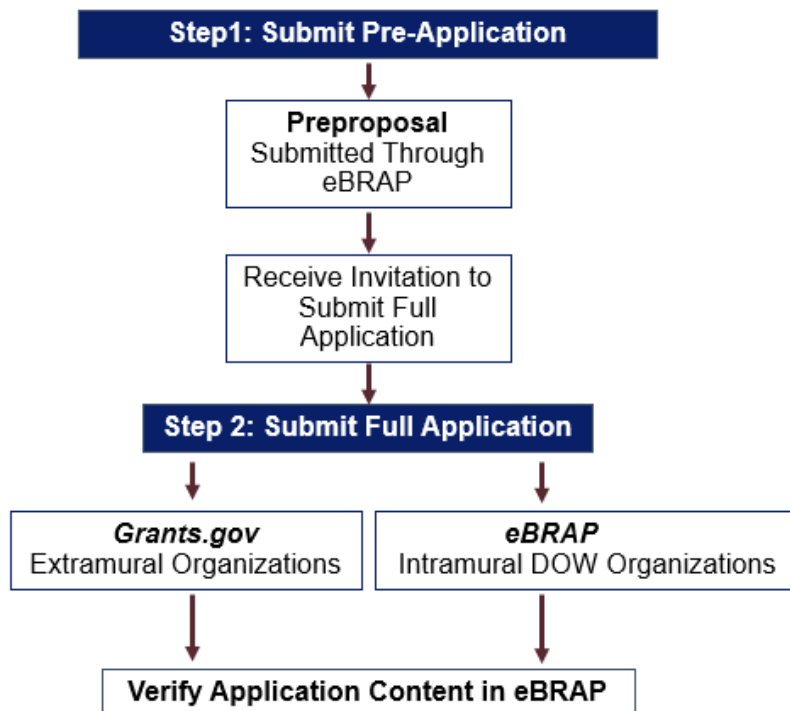
5.2. Unique Entity Identifier and System for Award Management

The applicant organization must be registered as an entity in the System for Award Management (SAM), [SAM.gov](#), and receive confirmation of an “Active” status before submitting an application through Grants.gov. Organizations must include the unique entity identifier (UEI) generated by the SAM in applications to this funding opportunity and maintain an active registration in the SAM at all times during which it has an active Federal award or an application under consideration. 

5.3. Submission Instructions

The CDMRP uses two portal systems to accept pre- and full application submissions. The workflow below shows which portal system to use for pre- and full application submissions, respectively.

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5.3.1. Pre-Application Submission


All pre-application components must be submitted by the PI through [eBRAP](#). 


During the pre-application process, eBRAP assigns each submission a unique log number. This unique log number is required during [the full application submission process](#). The eBRAP log number, application title and all information for the PI, Business Official(s), performing organization, and contracting organization must be consistent throughout the entire pre-application and full application submission process. Inconsistencies may delay application processing and limit or negate the ability to view, modify and verify the application in eBRAP. Contact the [eBRAP Help Desk](#) if any changes need to be made.

5.3.2. Full Application Submission

Grants.gov Submissions: Full applications from extramural organizations *must* be submitted through the Grants.gov Workspace. 

eBRAP Submissions: Only [intramural DOW organizations](#) may submit full applications through eBRAP. 

5.3.3. Applicant Verification of Full Application Submission in eBRAP

Independent of the submission portal, once the full application is submitted, it is transmitted to and processed in eBRAP; the transmission to eBRAP may take up to 48 hours. At this stage, the PI and organizational representatives will receive an email from eBRAP instructing them to log in to eBRAP to review, modify and verify the full application submission. 
The Project Narrative and Research & Related Budget Form cannot be changed after the application submission deadline. Other application components, including subaward budget(s) and subaward budget justification(s), may be changed until the [application verification period](#) ends. The full application cannot be modified once the application verification period ends.

5.4. Submission Dates and Times

The pre-application and full application submission process should be started early to avoid missing deadlines. Regardless of submission portal used, all pre- and full application components must be submitted by the deadlines stipulated in this program announcement. There are no grace periods for deadlines; failure to meet submission deadlines will result in application rejection. ***The DHACA cannot make allowances/exceptions for submission problems encountered by the applicant.***

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5.5. Intergovernmental Review

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6. Application Review Information

6.1. Application Compliance Review

Submitting applications that propose essentially the same research project to different funding opportunities within the same program and fiscal year is prohibited and will result in administrative withdrawal of the duplicative application(s).

While it is allowable to propose similar research projects to different programs within the CDMRP or to other organizations, duplication of funding or accepting funding from more than one source for the same research is prohibited. See the [CDMRP's Directive on Research Duplication](#).

Including classified research data within the application and/or proposing research that may produce classified outcomes or outcomes deemed sensitive to national security concerns, may result in application withdrawal. 

Members of the FY26 ATRP Programmatic Panel must not be involved in any pre-application or full application including, but not limited to, concept design, application development, budget preparation and the development of any supporting documentation, including personal letters of support/recommendation for the research and/or PI. Programmatic panel members **may** provide [letters](#) to confirm [PI eligibility](#) and access to laboratory space, equipment and other resources necessary for the project if that is part of their regular roles and responsibilities (e.g., as Department Chair). ***A list of the [FY26 ATRP Programmatic Panel members](#) can be found on the CDMRP website.***

6.2. Review Criteria

6.2.1. Pre-Application Screening Criteria

To determine the merits of the pre-application and the relevance to the mission of the Defense Health Program and the ATRP, pre-applications will be screened based on the following criteria:

- **Alignment With a Focus Area:** How well the project addresses the selected FY26 ATRP CRA Focus Area and the intent of the award mechanism.
- **Research Idea and Strategy:** How well the rationale, hypothesis/objectives, and specific aims support the research idea. Whether the proposed study design is appropriate to the specific aims.
- **Impact:** To what extent the potential outcome(s) of the proposed study, if successful, will impact patient care and reduce the burden of arthritis disease. Whether the proposed work and potential research outcomes are relevant to the military.

6.2.2. Peer Review Criteria

To determine technical merit, all applications will be evaluated individually according to the following **scored criteria**, which are of equal importance:

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- **Clinical Impact**

- To what degree the clinical study addresses current clinical need(s); improves upon available interventions and/or standards of care; or addresses controversies, treatment issues or health disparities within the field.
- How impactful the anticipated outcomes of the proposed clinical trial would be to the target population with regard to the [FY26 ATRP CRA Focus Area\(s\)](#).
- How well the input of the community collaborator(s) (e.g., Lived Experience Consultants, representatives of community-based organizations) has been and/or will be captured; and to what extent this input has been and/or will be meaningfully integrated and incorporated into the needs assessment, planning, design, execution, analysis and/or dissemination of the research.
- If applicable, to what degree the proposed research addresses health areas and conditions that affect women uniquely, disproportionately or differently from men; and to what extent the project findings are anticipated to lead to improvements in women's health outcomes and/or advancements in knowledge for women's health.
- If applicable, to what extent the anticipated outcomes of the proposed study will make an impact in understanding health differences between sexes.

- **Research Strategy and Feasibility**

- How well the scientific rationale for the proposed clinical study is supported by the review and analysis of the available literature and completed/ongoing studies.
- How well the specific aims/hypotheses/research question, study design, experimental methods, data collection procedures and evaluations are designed to address the clinical objective and purpose of the study.
- How well the studies are designed to achieve reproducible and rigorous results, including the endpoints/outcomes to be measured.
- To what degree the planned route and schedule of study intervention(s), evaluations(s), and follow-up procedures are reasonable for study participants to experience.
- How well potential challenges and alternative strategies are discussed.
- If applicable, whether measures are described to ensure the consistency of dosing (e.g., active ingredients for nutritional supplements, rehabilitation interventions).
- If applicable, to what degree the application includes preclinical and/or clinical evidence to support the safety and stability (as appropriate) of the intervention.
- If applicable, whether there is evidence indicating availability of the intervention from its source for the duration of the proposed clinical trial (if applicable).

- **Recruitment, Accrual and Retention**

- To what degree the plan for recruiting, enrolling, and retaining study participants is reasonable to meet the needs of the proposed clinical study.
- How well the application identifies possible delays (e.g., slow/low enrollment, poor retention) and presents adequate mitigation plans to resolve them.
- To what degree the number of study participants to be enrolled is reasonable based upon the proposed timeline, study procedures, available study population, inclusion/exclusion criteria, and planned efforts to achieve accrual goals.

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- Whether the distribution of the proposed enrollment on the basis of age, sex, race, and/or ethnicity is appropriate for the proposed research.
- If applicable, whether the justification for limiting inclusion of any demographic group, including sex, is sufficiently strong.
- To what extent the strategy for recruitment and retention of women and minorities in the clinical study is appropriate to the objectives of the study.

 - How well the documentation provided supports the feasibility of acquiring an active IND or IDE (and/or international equivalent) covering the proposed trial, if applicable.
 - To what extent the regulatory strategy and product development plan are well described and appropriate to support the product indication or product label change, if applicable.
- **Transition Plan**
 - To what degree the next logical steps to be taken upon successful completion of the proposed clinical trial are realistic and appropriate to bring the research outcome(s) to the next stage of clinical development/implementation/dissemination.
 - To what degree the collaborations and other resources (e.g., clinical partners, commercial partners, manufacturing partners, clinical practice guideline development/execution committees, training providers/resources) intended to help advance the research outcome(s) are established and/or achievable.
 - To what degree ownership rights/access to the intellectual property necessary for the development and/or commercialization of products or technologies supported with this award are considered and planned for.
- **Statistical Plan and Data Analysis**
 - To what degree the statistical model and data analysis plan are suitable for the planned study objectives.
 - To what degree the sample size projections are adequate to ensure proper power for the study, and as applicable, any subgroup analysis.
 - Whether the strategy for considering sex as a biological variable is appropriate to the objectives of the study, or whether the justification for a single-sex study is sufficiently strong.
 - If a phase 3 trial is proposed, whether the plans for the valid analysis of group differences on the basis of sex, race, and/or ethnicity are appropriate for the proposed research.
- **Ethical Considerations**
 - Whether the population selected to participate in the study stands to benefit from the knowledge gained.
 - How the level of risk to human subjects is minimized, and how the safety monitoring and reporting plan is appropriate for the level of risk.

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- To what degree the process of seeking informed consent is appropriate, and whether safeguards are in place for vulnerable populations.
- To what extent the proposed clinical study might affect the daily lives of the individual human subjects participating in the study.
- If applicable, to what degree barriers to clinical trial participation have been considered and/or addressed.

In addition, the following criteria will also contribute to the overall evaluation of the application, but will not be individually scored and are therefore termed **unscored criteria**:

- **Personnel and Communication**

- To what degree the composition of the study team, including any external consultants or advisors (e.g., statistician, regulatory expert, commercialization consultant, clinical ethicist, patient advocate), is appropriate to accomplish the proposed work.
- To what degree the qualifications and background of the community collaborator(s) (e.g., Lived Experience Consultants, representatives of community-based organizations) are relevant to their roles within the team and to the proposed research project.
- Whether the levels of effort of the study team members are appropriate for successful conduct of the proposed study.
- How well the logistical aspects of the proposed study (e.g., communication plan, data transfer and management, standardization of procedures, multi-institutional structure governing the research protocol[s]) are appropriate and meet the needs of the proposed clinical effort.

- **Research Sharing Plan**

- To what extent the plan for sharing of project data and research resources is appropriate and reasonable and includes dissemination to affected communities, study participants and/or the scientific community. If applicable, whether specific repository(ies) are named where data and research resources arising from the project will be stored.

- **Personnel**

- How appropriate the expertise and levels of effort are for successful conduct of the proposed work.

- **Budget**

- Whether the budget is appropriate for the proposed research.

- **Environment**

- To what degree the scientific environment, clinical setting, and the accessibility of institutional resources support the clinical trial at each participating center or institution (including collaborative arrangements).
- Whether there is evidence for appropriate institutional commitment from each participating institution.

- **Application Presentation**

- To what extent the writing, clarity and presentation of the application components influence the review.

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6.2.3. Programmatic Review

To make funding recommendations and select the application(s) that, individually or collectively, will best achieve the program objectives, the following criteria are used by programmatic reviewers:

- Ratings and evaluations of peer reviewers
- Relevance to the priorities of the FY26 ATRP, as evidenced by the following:
 - Adherence to the intent of the funding opportunity
 - Program portfolio balance
 - Relative impact, including relevance to military health

6.3. Application Review and Selection Process

6.3.1. Pre-Application

Following the pre-application screening, PIs will be notified as to whether they are invited to submit full applications. The estimated date when PIs can expect to receive notification of an invitation to submit a full application is indicated in [Section 1, Basic Information about the Funding Opportunity](#). No feedback (e.g., a critique of the pre-application's strengths and weaknesses) is provided at this stage. Because the invitation to submit a full application is based on the contents of the pre-application, investigators should not change the title or research objectives after the pre-application is submitted.

6.3.2. Full Application

All applications are evaluated by scientists, clinicians and consumers in a two-tier review process. The first tier is **peer review**, the evaluation of applications against established criteria to determine technical merit, where each application is assessed for its own merit, independent of other applications. The second tier is **programmatic review**, a comparison-based process in which applications with high scientific and technical merit are further evaluated for programmatic relevance. Final recommendations for funding are subject to review and approval by a designated official. ***The highest-scoring applications from the first tier of review are not automatically recommended for funding. Funding recommendations depend on various factors as described in [Section 6.2.3, Programmatic Review](#).*** Additional information about the two-tier process used by the CDMRP can be found on the [CDMRP website](#).

Funding of applications received is contingent upon the availability of federal funds for this program, the number of applications received, the quality and merit of the applications as evaluated by peer and programmatic review, and the requirements of the government. Funds to be obligated on any award resulting from this funding opportunity will be available for use for a [limited time period](#) based on the fiscal year of the funds.

6.4. Risk, Integrity and Performance Information

Prior to making an assistance agreement award where the federal share is expected to exceed the simplified acquisition threshold, as defined in the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 2, Part 200.1 (2 CFR 200.1), over the period of performance, the federal awarding agency is required to review and consider any information about the applicant that is available in the SAM.

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An applicant organization may review the SAM and submit comments on any information currently available about the organization that a federal awarding agency previously entered. The federal awarding agency will consider any comments by the applicant, in addition to other information in the designated integrity and performance system, in making a judgment about the applicant's integrity, business ethics and record of performance under federal awards when determining a recipient's qualification prior to award, according to the qualification standards of the Department of Defense Grant and Agreement Regulations (DoDGARs), Section 22.415.

In accordance with National Security Presidential Memorandum-33 and all associated laws, all fundamental research funded by the DOW must be evaluated for affiliations with foreign entities. All applicant organizations must disclose foreign affiliations of all key personnel named on applications. Failure to disclose foreign affiliations of key personnel shall lead to withdrawal of recommendations to fund applications. Applicant organizations may be presented with an opportunity to mitigate identified risks, particularly those pertaining to influence from foreign entities specified in law. Implementation of mitigation discussions and utilization of the [DOD Component Decision Matrix](#) must decrease risk of foreign influence in accordance with the above-mentioned laws and guidance prior to award.

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7. Federal Award Notices

For each compliant full application received, the organizational representative(s) and PI will receive email notification when the funding recommendations are posted to eBRAP, typically within 6 weeks after programmatic review. At this time, each PI will receive a peer review summary statement on the strengths and weaknesses of the application and an information paper describing the application receipt and review process for the ATRP award mechanisms. The information papers and a list of organizations and PIs recommended for funding are also posted on the program's page within the CDMRP website. After all awards are made, the CDMRP includes individual award information in a searchable [database](#).

If an application is recommended for funding, after the email notification is posted to eBRAP, a government representative will contact the person authorized to negotiate on behalf of the recipient organization.

Only an appointed DHACA Grants Officer may obligate the government to the expenditure of funds to an extramural organization. No commitment on the part of the government should be inferred from discussions with any other individual. ***The award document signed by the Grants Officer is the official authorizing document (i.e., assistance agreement).***

Intragovernmental obligations of funding will be made according to the terms of a negotiated Inter-Agency Agreement and managed by a CDMRP Science Officer.

Funding obligated to ***intragovernmental and intramural DOW organizations*** will be sent through the Military Interdepartmental Purchase Request (MIPR), Funding Authorization Document (FAD) or Direct Charge Work Breakdown Structure processes. Transfer of funds is contingent upon appropriate safety and administrative approvals. Intragovernmental and intramural DOW investigators and collaborators must coordinate receipt and commitment of funds through their respective Resource Manager/Task Area Manager/Comptroller or equivalent Business Official. 

An organization may, at its own risk and without the government's prior approval, incur obligations and expenditures to cover costs up to 90 days before the beginning date of the initial budget period of a new award.

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8. Post-Award Requirements

8.1. Administrative and National Policy Requirements

Applicable requirements in the DoDGARs found in 32 CFR, Chapter I, Subchapter C, and 2 CFR, Chapter XI, apply to grants and cooperative agreements resulting from this program announcement.

If there are delinquencies in technical reporting requirements for any existing DHA or U.S. Army Medical Research and Development Command awards at the applicant organization, DHACA will not issue any new awards to the applicant organization until all delinquent reports have been submitted.

Applications recommended for funding that involve animals, human data, human specimens, human subjects or human cadavers must be reviewed for compliance with federal and DOD animal and/or human subjects protection requirements and must be approved by the DHA R&D Office of Research and Regulatory Compliance (ORRC), prior to implementation. This administrative review requirement is in addition to the local Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC), IRB or Ethics Committee (EC) review.



8.2. Reporting

Quarterly and annual technical progress reports, as well as a final technical progress report, will be required. Technical progress reports must be prepared in accordance with the Research Performance Progress Report (RPPR).

Enrollment reporting on the basis of sex, race, and ethnicity will be required with each annual and final progress report. The [PHS Inclusion Enrollment Report](#) is available in eBRAP.

The Award Terms and Conditions will specify whether additional and/or more frequent reporting is required.

Award Expiration Transition Plan: An Award Expiration Transition Plan, using the template available on eBRAP, must be submitted with the final progress report.

Awards resulting from this program announcement may entail additional reporting requirements related to recipient integrity and performance matters. Recipient organizations that have federal contract, grant and cooperative agreement awards with a cumulative total value greater than \$10M are required to provide information to the SAM about certain civil, criminal and administrative proceedings that reached final disposition within the most recent 5-year period and that were connected with their performance of a federal award. These recipients are required to disclose, semiannually, information about criminal, civil and administrative proceedings as specified in the applicable [Representations](#).

8.3. Additional Requirements

Unless otherwise restricted, changes in the PI or organization will be allowed on a case-by-case basis, provided the intent of the award mechanism is met.

9.2.2. Modification

- Pages exceeding the specified limits will be removed prior to reviewing all documents.
- Documents not requested will be removed.

9.2.3. Withdrawal

The following may result in administrative withdrawal of the full application:

- A member of the FY26 ATRP Programmatic Panel is named as being involved in the development or execution of the research proposed or is found to have assisted in the pre-application or application processes.
- The application includes the name(s) of personnel from either of the CDMRP peer or programmatic review companies for which conflicts cannot be adequately mitigated. For FY26, the identities of the peer review contractor and the programmatic review contractor may be found on the [CDMRP website](#).
- Personnel from applicant or collaborating organizations are found to have contacted persons involved in the review or approval process to gain protected evaluation information or to influence the evaluation process.

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- The application from an extramural organization, including non-DOW federal agencies, is received through eBRAP.
- The federal government recipient organization (including an intramural DOW organization): (a) cannot accept and execute the entirety of the requested budget in FY26 funds; and/or (b) cannot coordinate the use of contractual, assistance or other appropriate agreements to provide funds to collaborators.
- The application fails to conform to this program announcement description.
- The application includes URLs, with the exception of links in the References Cited and Publication and/or Patent sections.
- The application includes research data that are classified and/or proposes research that may produce classified outcomes, or outcomes deemed sensitive to national security concerns.

Applications that appear to involve research misconduct will be administratively withheld from further consideration pending organizational investigation. The organization will be required to provide the findings of the investigation to the DHACA Grants Officer for a determination of the final disposition of the application.
